agree with the present Earl.³⁸ I have often wished to rummage that collection. I was once in the room in an evening, going to see the house;³⁹ but am not acquainted with the possessor. I knew his brother⁴⁰ very well, but the library was then in the possession of his grandmother, the very old Lady Longueville,⁴¹ and I did promise myself a feast—but he did not live long enough!

I do not know whether I told you that I am engaged in a very curious work, a revision of the reign of Richard III.⁴² I do not call it a vindication, because that would sound like a paradox, and I go upon better grounds. A very curious monument or memorial has been lately discovered,⁴³ which opened such a new scene, that it sent me upon looking farther, and the more I have sifted that dark period, the more discoveries, I think, I have made. I will not anticipate your entertainment, Sir, as the work is in a manner finished, and will be published this winter.
