you whether it would be possible to induce him to let me have duplicates of *five* of the plates; I would willingly pay any price he would value them at.<sup>3</sup>

The five, are of William Bruges the first Garter;<sup>4</sup> the six Heralds;<sup>5</sup> of Richard III with his cognizances;<sup>6</sup> of Sir John Wriothesley,<sup>7</sup> and of Sir W. Dugdale.<sup>8</sup> I have Hollar's,<sup>9</sup> but prefer this, it has so amiable a countenance. Adieu!

He left London 20 March 1794 and arrived at Constantinople 20 May (information from Mr Fleming; GM 1834, n.s., ii pt ii. 319; letter from Dallaway to Samuel Lysons, 28 Nov. 1794, now wst.). Upon his return to England Dallaway published *Constantinople Ancient and Modern*, 1797.

- 3. In the Gosford sale catalogue HW's copy of the *Inquiries* is described as having 'numerous fine proof plates,' doubtless the plates here requested.
- 4. William Bruges (d. 1449), whom Henry V created (1417) the first Garter king-of-arms: i.e., the chief herald who controls armorial devices (John Anstis, The Register of the Most Noble Order of the Garter, 1724, i. 322, 343-4). The plate in Dallaway is opposite p. 124; it is in

colour, as are all the others HW requested, except the print of Dugdale.

- 5. I.e., the six provincial kings-of-arms, 1530-60. The plate faces p. 174.
- 6. Facing p. 133. 'This delineation shows the tabard as thrown over the armour, and the cognizance [a white boar] at his feet, with the ensigns of his principalities on either side' (ibid. p. iv). The portrait, in a roll of the Earls of Warwick, had been seen by HW in 1768 (HW to Gray 26 Feb. 1768, GRAY ii. 177-8).
- 7. Sir John Wriothesley (d. 1504), Garter king-of-arms. The plate faces p. 134.
- 8. Facing p. 332; engraved by J. Burché. Dallaway was mistaken as to the subject of the print; it is Sir William's son, Sir John Dugdale (1628-1700), Norroy king-of-arms (BM Cat. of Engraved British Portraits ii. 97: DNB sub Sir William Dugdale).
- 9. Wenceslaus Hollar (1607-77), engraver and painter. HW's copy of Hollar's print of Dugdale was sold London 213.
