An Inventionary of Alterations to be made at the Vine. JULY 1ST
1755

Within the House.

The staircase, to have four flights.

The little Strawberry parlour.

A commode. A couch, and two fly tables.

The great parlour.

Two large pictures, one at each end.

The two lesser doors to be stopped up.

Two half-length portraits of Lord and Lady Dacre on one side of the chimney.

On the other side, half-lengths of Mr J. Chute and the old Lady Dacre.

Over the doors, heads of Mr Whithed, Mr Gray, Mr Bentley, and Mr Walpole.

Drawing room within great parlour.

To be hung with green.

Over the chimney, view of Mabland.

A bedchamber and alcove to be within that.

The chimney piece of the stone gallery to be carried into . . . [MS defective] is to be a billiard room.

The great hall, to be quite plain.

For the old parlour.

Two large settees, and two chairs.

The Antechapel.

To be finished as the end is.

The windows to be painted by Price with the pedigree.

The chapel.

Three pictures under the windows, of the Lord's Supper, Christ in the garden, and Christ walking on the sea. The four Evangelists in the long panels on each side.
